Tuesday morning, January 11th, Jose M. Gonzales, one of our oldest and most esteemed citizens, passed away, at the age of 86 years. Mr. Gonzales came to the United States from Spain in 1868 settling in this valley in 1873. During all these years, or rather until health prevented him from participating in active work, he has taken a leading part in the

development of this part of the valley, having organized the first school district and taking a great interest in all work pertaining to the betterment of our schools. He also was deputy county assessor for twenty years, conducting the duties of this office in the most efficient manner. He leaves a wife, daughter, Mrs. A. B. Barnett, and son, O. Gonzales, of this valley and a brother in Mexico.

All this county was one big grant owned by Mrs. Pujol, and Mr. Gonzales was manager and agent for many years.

His ranch is part of the Temecula division of the big grant. He and Mr. Murrieta were partners. The Summers grant and the Pujol grant join.

Mrs. Gonzales, whose maiden name was Street, came from England with the Summer brothers. Mr. Gonzales and Miss Street were married in Elsinore.

Mr. Gonzales was highly educated and spoke seven or eight languages. He was very active in all the early improvements in this valley.

The Santa Fe at this station had an increase of revenue on freight business for the year ending December 31st 1920, of \$122,861.19 over any year since establishing this station.

The shipments consisted of the following car-load commodities: Potatoes 96; Lepidolite ore, 226; live stock, 261; and the balance of 234 cars consisted of beets, grain, hay, honey, rock, etc. a total of 817 cars. These figures were furnished by Mr. Sands, our local agent, and while doing so he stated that he wished to thank everyone for their co-operation during the busy season.

Temecula, June 8, 1921 – The community was shocked Saturday morning by the sudden death of Leopold Cantarini, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Cantarini. Death came after a few hours struggle with double pneumonia. He was taken ill on Thursday and was not thought to be in any danger. He seemed to grow better but a change for the worst came very suddenly and he passed away at six o'clock Saturday morning before the doctor reached him. The body was taken to Riverside where the funeral services were held on Tuesday morning, June 7th, from the St. Francis de Sale Church, Father O'Reaga officiating. The body was laid to rest in the Evergreen Cemetery in Riverside, many friends gathering to pay last tribute. Besides a host of friends he leaves to mourn his loss his father and mother, three sisters, Mary, Angeline and Serena, and four brothers, Joe, El Vetsey, Johnnie and Dan.

Leopold Cantarini was born in Switzerland thirty three years ago and came to this region with his parents when but a tiny lad. He has been one of the valley's foremost ranchers, being in partnership with his brothers in cultivating vast areas of land. He was a man of pleasant personality, quiet, unassuming, a man of his word and always to be depended upon. No young man has a nobler record than Leopold and his death is felt keenly by all who knew him. Mountain Fires Threaten Town, Barn Burns Temecula Defeats San Jacinto

September 30, 1921

Temecula, September 28 – The fire which has raged in the DeLuz canyon since Saturday or Sunday and has burned over several hundred acres of ground, suddenly changed its course on Tuesday, swept over the hills back of Temecula with a roar and threatened to wipe the resident section off the map. The barn of George Marruffo, containing all of his hay, a wagon, harness and other farm implements were burned before the fighters could check it. Mr. Greenfield's barn, containing trunks and boxes of stored clothing and household goods, burned and only efficient work saved the house for several times it caught on fire and had it burned there would have been little chance of saving the homes along the street as the wind did all it could to carry the flames. Many families gathered their valuables, ready to leave if it became necessary. All along the street the fire swept along the back fences of the yards and kept everyone on the jump putting out the little blazes as the barns and vegetation caught the flying sparks.

The Temecula people felt very thankful to have roofs over their heads Tuesday night and feel very grateful to the many people who came from near and far to aid and especially are they grateful to the Shope's bridge and building gang, the Santa Fe section crew, M.E. Barnett and his men and the Elsinore and Murrieta men.
